

5-Day Devotional

Day 1: The Depth of God's Grace

****Reading:**** Ephesians 3:8-9, 14-19

****Devotional:****

Paul describes Christ's riches as "unfathomable"—a depth that cannot be measured or traced out. Like an ocean explorer who never reaches the bottom, we can spend our entire lives discovering new dimensions of God's grace and still find more. His love doesn't run shallow, His mercy never runs dry, and His patience never wears thin. Today, pause and consider: how deep have you gone in exploring Christ's riches? Perhaps you've been living in the shallow waters of routine faith when God invites you to dive deeper. Take time to thank God for one aspect of His character you've recently discovered, and ask Him to reveal new depths of His unfailing love.

Day 2: Forgiveness—Chains Falling Off

****Reading:**** Luke 4:18-19; Colossians 2:13-14

****Devotional:****

The Greek word for forgiveness, **aphesis**, means release or letting go—like prison doors swinging open and chains falling to the ground. God's forgiveness isn't a mere overlooking of sin; it's a complete erasure of the debt. Imagine every sin you've committed written in a ledger, then picture Jesus dipping each page into His crimson blood until the ink disappears entirely. The record is gone. Nailed to the cross. This isn't just good news; it's liberating truth. You don't have to live like a prisoner anymore, haunted by past failures. If Christ has forgiven you, you are genuinely free. Today, identify one area of guilt you're still carrying and intentionally release it to the cross.

Day 3: Justification—The Gavel Has Fallen

****Reading:**** Romans 5:1-2; 2 Corinthians 5:21

****Devotional:****

Justification means being declared righteous in God's courtroom. Picture yourself standing before the Judge with overwhelming evidence against you. But before the sentence falls, Jesus steps forward as your substitute, taking your penalty upon Himself. The Judge then looks at you and declares: "Righteous." This isn't based on your performance but on Christ's perfect obedience credited to your account. "Just-as-if-I'd" never sinned. Here's the stunning truth: when God looks at you, He doesn't see your inconsistent Christian walk or your stumbles and failures. He sees His Son's righteousness. This verdict cannot be reversed. Peace with God is not a feeling that fluctuates—it's a settled legal reality. Live today in the confidence of this unchangeable verdict.

Day 4: Redemption—Bought with a Price

****Reading:**** Ephesians 1:7-8; 1 Peter 1:18-19

****Devotional:****

Redemption comes from the ancient slave market where captives could be purchased and set free. Christ stepped onto the auction block of humanity and paid an extraordinary price—His own blood—to ransom you from bondage to sin. But the Gospel goes further: He didn't just purchase your freedom and leave you to fend for yourself. He brought you home. You've been redeemed from sin's penalty (past), you're being redeemed from sin's power (present), and you will be redeemed from sin's presence (future). Grace is free, but it was never cheap. Every drop of Christ's blood was the currency of your liberation. When the enemy whispers that you're still bound, remember: your chains lie at the foot of the cross. You belong to Christ now.

Day 5: Adoption—Called Children of God

****Reading:**** Romans 8:14-17; Galatians 4:4-7; John 1:12-13

****Devotional:****

Adoption is the most intimate of all the Gospel riches. God isn't merely a Judge who clears you or a Redeemer who frees you—He's a Father who embraces you. In Roman culture, adoption gave full inheritance rights that could never be revoked. God looked into the brokenness of humanity, pointed at you, and said, "That one—I choose them." He paid the price, brought you home, dressed you in robes of righteousness, and said, "Call Me Father." This is why the Holy Spirit teaches your heart to cry "Abba, Father"—an intimate term of endearment. You're not a distant subject or a servant hoping for approval. You're a beloved son or daughter with full access to the Father's presence. When you fail, run TO Him, not FROM Him. Children always come home.

****Closing Reflection:****

These four jewels in the crown of grace—Forgiveness, Justification, Redemption, and Adoption—are yours in Christ. You cannot earn them or bargain for them, but you must receive them by faith. May you live as a freed, righteous, redeemed, beloved child of God, exploring the unfathomable riches of Christ for the rest of your days.
