EXECUTIVE MINISTER'S REPORT



Friends,

I had barely put my feet on the sand when the Seal Beach lifeguard truck sped toward me while, simultaneously, a loudspeaker was commanding me to evacuate the beach immediately. Why? Was there a tsunami approaching? Sharks? Just what was the emergency? The beach was deserted on the rainy Tuesday morning, March 24, 2020.

The lieutenant explained to me that I was to leave or face a \$1,000 fine. Then he softened with a one-word explanation, "Covid." The city council

had met the night before concluding that Covid could spread, even on the rainy beach. I went home to shelter in place. Welcome to the quarantine.



After about two weeks, I was going stir crazy and just had to get out. The city leaders concluded that bike riding was not as dangerous as surfing, so I went bike riding. Then, the city leaders at the town down the street concluded that the beach there would not spread the Covid virus, so I stepped out and went surfing. I was so grateful to get out. Thank you, Lord!

By contrast, some people have told me that they got way too comfortable with staying in, preferring social media, TV, and lethargy to "stepping out." I'm just not wired that way when it comes to outdoor pursuits. However, and I'm not proud of this, as an introvert, I am often way too comfortable with "my" church, complete with "my" holy huddle and "my" songs, during "my" time slot.

Especially when it comes to "doing church," we all need to "step out" of our comfort zones to reach diverse people in our ever-changing environments. Holy Scriptures command us to make disciples of all ethnicities (Matthew 28:19) while reaching new generations, (Psalm 78:4).

We have some cutting-edge churches that are doing just that. For example, Primera Iglesia Bautista de South Gate recently planted an English-speaking church, targeting the local neighborhood with a lively service, reaching an eclectic group of mostly younger people. Panorama Baptist Church saw fit to expand the role of women in ministry and helped us launch an initiative with a generous grant. Monte Vista Baptist Church in Phoenix houses their "original" church, along with a Karen Church (founded by Burmese refugees), and a cross-cultural Latino church that is doing amazing work for both local and migrant communities. It all started in 2008, when the church, under the leadership of the Pastor at that time, Stan Crews, simply said "yes" to open the church's doors in non-traditional ways.

In addition to having been their pastor, Stan has been a Mexico missionary and most recently our Region Resource Minister for the past five years. We are so grateful for his service in Arizona and Southern Nevada. He is calling his most recent move "retirement." However, as active as he continues to be, I know that we will get to cross paths with him and his wonderful wife Gayle, often.

Filling Stan's big shoes is Paul Gibson. Paul steps into the role with a wealth of experience. He and his wife, Melissa, moved to the Phoenix area after completing a successful stint as Executive Minister of the Great Rivers Region, serving Illinois and Missouri. I met Paul when we both were church planters about 100 years or so ago. He has already hit the ground running and has visited all our Southern Nevada and Arizona churches.

Please see the following pages for specific examples of how Paul and our other Region Resource Ministers are helping our churches to "step out" and become even stronger forces for the cause of Christ. We do this in four ways, by:

- Equipping with tools, webinars, Zoom calls, one-on-one visits, and in-person training.
- Protecting title to make sure that the church continues to exist for new generations.

- Connecting people, churches, ministries, and missionaries (Global Servants) with one another.

We can only accomplish this herculean task with the help of our strong staff as well as our board members who do the heavy lifting and lead our many dedicated volunteers. Staff and board names and photos appear on the following pages.

Additionally, our ABC affiliates (headed by ABC-USA, ABHMS, MMBB, and IM*) provide us with an umbrella of care. We are also grateful for every church and individual that support us financially, with a ministry of presence, and with prayer.

Speaking of which, we could not breathe or move, let alone "step out," without our Lord Jesus Christ who stepped out to live life on the earth, freely accepting death and separation from God on a cruel cross, ultimately stepping up, ascending to heaven, giving us life abundant and eternal. 

ORDINATION STANDARDS COMMITTEE

What is the Ordination Committee all about?

Ordination is the Church's recognition of the call of God in a person's life to take pastoral leadership in the local church or the wider church's ministry. For Baptists, it is the local church's job to ordain its pastoral leaders. A local congregation can do this without the consultation of the wider ABC family, in which case that ordination is recognized in the realm of that local church. For one's ordination to be recognized by all ABC churches, one must have the recommendation to ordain by the region's ordination committee. This recognized ordination is called the "Standard American Baptist Ordination."

The process of receiving this recommendation begins after the candidate meets specific requirements, including education, which the wider ABC family establishes. Once the candidate has completed the educational requirements, their local church writes a letter to the ordination committee of the region asking to begin the examination process. At that point, the candidate receives information on what they need to do before meeting with the ordination committee. This includes confirmation education, personal references, a document written by the candidate reflecting their theological understanding, their call to faith and ministry, signed affirmation of the ABC Ministerial Code of Ethics, and psychological evaluation. Once the candidate has completed all these requirements, they are scheduled to meet with the ordination committee.

The ordination committee of ABCOFLASH consists of ordained clergy from various churches and ministries within our region. There are also representatives of the region staff that meet with the committee. The committee examines the candidate primarily based on what is in the written document and the personal references. If the candidate is found to be qualified at the end of that examination, the committee votes to recommend to the candidate's local church that they should proceed to ordain that candidate. At that point, it is in the hands of the congregation to have a service of ordination for the candidate.

Occasionally, the ordination committee is called to recognize the ordination of someone who is coming from another denomination. Much of the process for that recognition is similar to that listed above but often does not end up in an ordination service, as the candidate has already been ordained.

This process reflects a historical aspect of being Baptist. The local church does the ordination, which reflects the local church's autonomy. The examination and recognition of that ordination by representatives of the association of ABC churches in an area reflects the voluntary, cooperative aspect of being Baptist. This commitment to cooperation helps to provide checks and balances and develop ministerial leadership for the broader church family.

Please pray for the ordination committee of ABCOFLASH as we do our small but important part in raising ministerial leadership for our church, region, denomination, and world.

Latino (Brazilian and Hispanic) Churches

August 2021:

- I visited churches in Las Vegas and saw how those churches were doing after they reopened, which has been difficult for them.
- We held a retreat for pastors and wives in Oxnard with 25 couples in attendance.

September 2021:

- I visited the Brazilian churches and pastors in South San Francisco. One of those churches has planted a Hispanic church that meets in their facility.
- We had several graduates from ABTC (American Baptist Theological Center).



November 2021

I visited churches in Arizona and gave workshops with the leaders of the Latino churches. Our goal is what the apostle Paul said in Acts 14:22: "strengthening the disciples and encouraging them to remain true to the faith."

New Churches Planting and Training

The prophet Isaiah said in chapter 54:2 to encourage the people of Israel to expand their vision which is what we do as we equip pastors and leaders in new and established churches.

January 2022

 In partnership with Ministerios Manantial de Amor, we planted a new church in Orlando, Florida. Pastor Enrique Santis and I traveled there to dedicate Pastor Jorge Monteagudo who started this new church. Pastor Jorge's vision is to start more churches in Florida besides the three they've already started.

April and June 2022

 We had training events for all new church planters and churches struggling after the pandemic. We provided strategies for refocusing the church on bringing new people to Christ and leading them into discipleship, as most churches lost about 30% of their membership because of the pandemic.

Ministry of Women, Men, Youth and Children, and Pastors in Latino Churches

October 2021

Forty pastors and wives gathered to celebrate and be encouraged to persevere amid the effects of the pandemic on their churches.



November 2021

The men's ministry had a retreat at Victory Ranch. They were ministered to as fathers, husbands, and leaders of their congregations. Additional gatherings of men happened in different associations throughout the year.

April 2022

The women's retreat in Big Bear had a tremendous impact on the 250 women who attended. Sister Juana Valdez leads this ministry with the help of her committee, who give so much to lead our Latina women's ministry.

Training for all Pastors and Lay Leaders

Every year we organize training and workshops to provide tools for church members to serve better in their churches. We have a pastoral assessment and continuing education in partnership with American Baptist Theological Center (ABTC). We also have six different academies that are training lay leaders. Most of them attend the program we have with ABTC and the University of LaVerne, and many continue their education in seminary.



Family Ministries and Lay Couples Retreats



Families are the pillars of our society. Our slogan is, "Strong families build a strong church and a healthy society." Throughout the year, we have facilitated

celebrate and recommit ourselves to serving God.


We are grateful to the ABCOFLASH Board of Directors and all who supported these ministries among our Latino congregations and made it possible for us to execute all our plans throughout the year.


because of the good things that we are doing instead of possible bad things. Be ready. People are watching.

are taking orders for bentos to enjoy a time of food and fellowship once a month following our worship service. In June, we had a Bible Camp for children grades K-6, and in July, we had a rummage sale and raised nearly \$1000 for needy children at Queen Ka'ahumanu School and other children's ministries.





New Life Baptist Church

We offer simultaneous in-person and online services on Sundays. Once a month, usually on the last Sunday of the month, we conduct our service outdoors at Kapiolani Park. Our weekly Bible study is still offered online only, but we plan to return to face-to-face studies

SAN DIEGO ASSOCIATION

2022 has been a year in which San Diego-area American Baptist churches have moved in ministry, service, and fellowship. Local church leaders and missionaries gathered in December at URBN Pizza for a Christmas Luncheon and Devotional, which was a wonderful time.

For churches, church plants, parachurch ministries, and spiritually exhausted leaders, 2021-2022 was a time when many pandemic-related crises came to a head. We continue to pray for all to feel God's strength, compassion, and guidance.



Like most Southern California communities, San Diego is grappling with how to provide care and practical support for our homeless neighbors. ABCOFLASH churches were invited to participate in several initiatives to help address homelessness. One example is the We All Count Point-in-Time Count, which allows congregations to get to know homeless neighbors in their area and serves as a basis for allocating federal HUD funds for homelessness-abatement programs. Another example is the Amikas Meridian Tiny Cottage Project. This is a partnership to build emergency housing units for homeless single mothers and children. The six teams in the pilot project opened at the start of August, which is a tremendous blessing.

At a time of continued conflict in Yemen, Ethiopia, and Myanmar, many American Baptists' hearts were moved as well by the plight of Ukraine in the wake of Russia's invasion. We took part in an ABCOFLASH-sponsored international forum to highlight responses to the invasion of Ukraine by Baptists in Europe, the US, and beyond. San Diego American Baptists were also blessed by the Third Thursday leadership and discipleship seminars sponsored by ABCOFLASH.




Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

As ABTC Executive Director, I have highlighted below the various activities that have transpired throughout the year 2022:

1. Student Resources:

- The Hispanic Convention Scholarship Committee gives full support with scholarships to our University of La Verne (ULV) and Fuller students.
- KOSA Scholarship: The Fuller Foundation, the administrator of KOSA Scholarships, keeps ABTC well informed about students receiving scholarships and how much financial resources are available to them.
- American Baptist Home Mission Societies has continued to provide resources to our students.





4. Christian Leadership Academies:

Under the leadership of Dr. Saul Maldonado (Dean), we have established academies for our constituencies at the following locations:

- Los Angeles, CA: Paradise Baptist Church and Hispanic Baptist Church
- Glendale, AZ: Hispanic First Baptist Church
- San Diego, CA: First Mexican Baptist Church
- · Anaheim, CA: First Baptist Church

5. Relationship with Fuller Theological Seminary:

We continue to maintain a good and improved relationship with Fuller Theological Seminary.

6. Hispanic Continuing Education:

We sponsor continuing education events for our pastors, and ABTC provides continuing education credits to the participants.

- 7. University of La Verne. I have met with Dr. Kristan Venegas, the new Associate Provost. We are recommending that ULV provide two new bachelor's programs (Behavioral Science and Computer Science) besides the already existing major program in Religion and Philosophy.
- **8.Administrative Assistant:** Luis Rentería continues to serve as our Administrative Assistant. He provides excellent leadership in our office, especially with the increasing number of students in our Academic Programs.

9. A progress report on student enrollment in our three programs:

- Fuller: 30 students
- ULV: 12 active students and 45 transition students, the sum of which is 57 students
- The Academies: 100 students
- Total: 187 students

10. ABTC financial. By the grace of God, we had the financial resources to fulfill our responsibilities during the year 2022. Our sincere gratitude to Mr. Ronald Banes for his significant contributions to ABTC. Also, our sincere gratitude to ABCOFLASH, the Rev. Andy Quient, and Dr. José Menendez (Executive Minister and Regional Resource Minister for Latino Ministries, respectively) for their significant contribution and support for 2021/2022.

11. Important Accomplishments:

We are very close to being recognized by AETH (the parallel Hispanic organization of ATS), an organization that certifies programs of theological institutions at the baccalaureate level.

- Creation of a Manual for the Academic. A very long process, but we are grateful to God that we have finished this well-defined Manual for the Academic. This manual will be in English and Portuguese language very soon.
- Dr. Miguel Albanéz indicated his congregation's intentions to establish Portuguese-language academies for their constituencies.
- The Hispanic Convention has approved scholarships for our academic, national, and international students.

We kicked off the year with our Virtual Health Fair, where 180 participants had access to educational information covering COVID-19, heart health, diabetes, oral health, mental health, and many more.

Affordable Housing

FIBCO provided "home building" opportunities for over 100 people through our twelve properties. We remain at capacity with a lengthy waitlist and operate under third-party management through Biltmore Properties Inc. All residents are low—income and might otherwise be homeless if we did not offer this program. It has been over a year since we formed our partnership with The House That Love Built (THTLB) as our tenant partner at the legacy Ujima House. They are successfully operating to help young women in transition.

New Logo and Website

We are delighted to share that we have upgraded our organization's public and digital image. As a result, we are bolder and more mobile in expanding our services and reaching the Phoenix metro area. In addition, it will enhance our ability to provide programs and services and communicate directly with our many constituents, clients, supporters, and funders.



Volunteer Hours

The Board of Directors volunteered over 750 hours in both "hands-on" and "minds-on" hours to FIBCO during 2021. In addition to the other volunteer hours (2,690) mentioned above and additional administrative staff volunteer hours, FIBCO is thankful for nearly 3,400 volunteer hours donated to FIBCO during 2021.

35th Anniversary

We were honored to celebrate FIBCO's 35th Anniversary and are excited about the promise and possibilities for FIBCO and for the community we serve as we continue to restructure with new, improved service delivery in 2022 and beyond. Despite challenges, and because of God, through you and others, FIBCO is moving forward and will get stronger and continue "Meeting the Needs of Our Community" in 2022 and beyond.



HANDS4HOPE

Serving San Fernando Valley families since 2000



Our Mission

Hands4Hope LA supports youth and their parents from low-income, under-resourced, predominantly single-parent minority households to improve their quality of life. Founded in 2000 in North Hollywood by ABCOFLASH Board Member Lydia Floyd, Hands4Hope LA provides free after-school enrichment programs, a very reduced-cost academic summer camp, and free parent/caregiver workshops and resource fairs. We foster a love of learning and curiosity in a fun, compassionate, trauma-informed, and culturally competent environment.

Free After School Programs

During the academic school year, students (ages 8-12) receive free daily snacks, one-on-one tutoring support, and STEAM-based enrichment classes after school Monday through Thursday until 6:30 pm at our main site. Hands4Hope LA staff also provide low-cost transportation from local public schools to our site. In 2021, we opened an additional site at Lankershim Elementa-



ry, providing free weekly music and art classes. This year we plan to open a new location in the Van Nuys area.

Teen Program

We engage and inspire our teens by exposing them to a wide variety of experiences, skills, jobs, and schools. Students get personalized attention with job skills training (resume creation, mock interviews, practice completing job applications), college preparation, job readiness training, and financial literacy education. Our age-appropriate (13-18) curriculum supports students in advancing to post-secondary education and/or the workforce, helping them develop skills and confidence to pursue their interests.



Academic Summer Camp

Our summer camp provides educational and outdoor activities for six weeks. Students work on their academics and enjoy field trips while reconnecting with old friends and making new ones. Each week focuses on a STEAM-directed academic subject, with project-based activities designed around that subject.




