The above verse was a prophetic word spoken over Judah, the son of Jacob. He said the scepter and the staff, which are the ruling instruments of a King, shall not depart from Judah until Shiloh (Shiloh is a name for God) comes. Jacob proclaimed that Judah would be the dominating leader over his brothers until the day God comes to lead the people.

We see a beautiful fulfillment of Jacob's words to Judah in this passage:

_____ 5:5 "And one of the _____ said to me, "Stop _____; behold, the _____ that is from the tribe of _____, the Root of David, has _____ so as to be able to open the scroll and its seven seals."

What Jacob proclaimed over Judah is called a Prophecy. A **PROPHECY** is defined as an inspired utterance of something to come. *Did you know* the bible is FULL of prophetic words spoken about Yeshua? There are over 300 prophecies that Yeshua fulfilled in His lifetime. Did you know that? Many of them occurred during the last week of His life. What are the chances of this? Think about it. Someone hundreds of years before Yeshua was born spoke about Him and then it happened. If we were to write this out mathematically that is 1 chance in 10^{28} or 1 with 28 zero's after that. Can you write 1 in 10^{28} ?

God sent His prophets to communicate His mercy. In the case of Nineveh, He sent Jonah. To Israel He sent Elijah and Jeremiah He sent to Judah. All of these prophets were sent to proclaim the Word of the Lord about God's kingdom here on earth. Yeshua is ruling and reigning TODAY and His prophets have gone out proclaiming His glory. Read Isaiah 61:1.

Talk about the message of Mercy Isaiah the Prophet shared.

Yeshua came to be with us, God dwelling among men. The verse you memorized today first was proclaimed by Isaiah the Prophet in Isaiah 7:14. **Why did Yeshua come and dwell among us?** Couldn't He have proclaimed that He forgave us and that would have been enough? **Today**, we are going to look at the MOST beautiful picture of Love that ever was or ever will be. The picture we are going to look at is the life of Yeshua the suffering servant.

Sin entered the world through Adam and brought death and separation from God. Through Isaiah, God revealed His plan for Yeshua, the promised Savior, would come to suffer and die, not for His own sin but for those of the people. Yeshua came and was obedient unto death, according to God's promised plan.

In this passage, we see that this promised Savior would be an ordinary man in appearance, like those he came to save, and would suffer and die, not for his own sin but for the sin of others.



_____ 53:2, "For He grew up before _____

From this verse we see that Yeshua possessed nothing physical that would have caused us to look to Him or even consider Him. Yet, Yeshua served us in the most powerful way. Sin always brings about suffering and shame. ***When Adam and Eve sinned in the Garden, they immediately hid themselves because of their shame.*** When the suffering servant came, He would experience the suffering and shame that was part of sin's consequence, though the sin for which He suffered was not His own. He would willingly endure this suffering, not because He deserved it, but because it was required for Him to walk in complete obedience to His Father's will.

Through animal sacrifices, God provided a picture of the necessity of a sin payment - a substitute to take God's punishment for sin. The Messiah would be the **"lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world"**. Yeshua would receive the piercing, crushing, and chastisement that we deserved. The sinless servant would take upon Himself the iniquity of all.

Passover reminds us of the blood of the Lamb placed upon the doorpost as a perfect picture of **Yeshua's** blood being applied to you and me. As a result, those cleansed by His blood receive His healing and peace. What rightly belonged to man, sin-suffering-death, was placed upon Him. What belonged to Him, righteousness and life, was given to man, through repentance and faith in Him.

What set this plan in motion? **What caused Yeshua to be the suffering Servant?**

The prophecy of Isaiah communicated how Yeshua would suffer in our place 700 years before it happened. Yeshua died for our sins. He took the punishment we deserved. He did all this to fully obey the will and plan of His Father, walking in perfect obedience and surrendering to Him. Because of His perfect obedience, even to the death on a cross, we can be counted free. **Do you know Yeshua today?**

In the story of Exodus, YHVH called upon Moses to return to Egypt and say to Pharaoh, "*Let my people GO!*" God told Moses He would have his brother, Aaron, go with him and stand against the Pharaoh as His witnesses. As the freed Hebrew people were walking through the wilderness, the Lord established Aaron and his descendants as priests and mediators between the people and the Lord.

The Aaronic priesthood stood as mediators judging and making decisions for the Hebrew people all throughout their wanderings. In Deuteronomy 17:9 we see the Lord instructing His people to go before the Levitical priests and make decisions for the people according to the Law of God. The people were to heed their instructions and follow their rulings. These priests had 1 MAJOR problem; can you guess what it was? _____

[Read Hebrews 7:26-28]

Let's talk about the priestly order of Melchizedek. What is this, does anyone know? The first time we see Melchizedek in scripture was when Abram brought Him and a tenth of the spoil after returning from rescuing Lot. Abram paid a tithe (tenth) to Melchizedek the Priest as a priest of the **Most High God**. This man Melchizedek is a great mystery, but there are a few things we do know about Him.

_____ 7:3, "Without _____, without _____, without genealogy, having neither _____ of days nor _____ of life, but made like the Son of God, he remains a priest _____."

Melchizedek has no beginning or end of days; He is a priest FOREVER. Just as He made mediation for Abram in Genesis 14, Melchizedek is forever making mediation for God's creation. In fact, the Priestly order of Melchizedek was BEFORE the Aaronic (Levitical) priesthood. Because Melchizedek has no beginning or end, it shows He is a perfect, sinless priest who doesn't need a sacrifice for Himself. Instead, He can act for the Glory of the Lord and the benefit of God's creation forever. God showed King David a picture of this.

David was writing about Yeshua! What do we know about Yeshua? He was born supernaturally without a Father. God caused Mary, His mother, to bring Him into this world. Yeshua then grew up and live normally like everyone else. He had **no glory** that would have caused people to look to Him, yet He served **God** and His creation to death and then He **ROSE** from the grave! He was sinless, never needing a priest to make Him clean. We know that Yeshua IS forever, He doesn't have a beginning or an end time!

This truth we are learning is so powerful. This truth reveals that Yeshua is God who came to live and die bringing peace between mankind, who has fallen away from God through sin. Now to whoever will come to the **Priest** who is able to make them righteous, they will have life! **Praise the Name of Yeshua!**

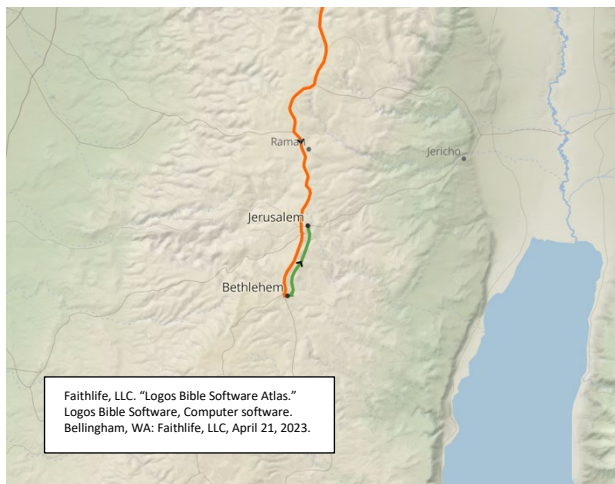

The Isaiah prophecy and the prophecy in Micah are most definitely talking of Yeshua and His birth! Have you ever stopped to think about the importance of sinless Yeshua being born into this world? Take some time to write down some things you know about the birth of Yeshua:

Let's take a look at some history of the ancient town of Bethlehem. The city of Bethlehem is the place where Jacob's son, Benjamin, was born to Rachel. After the birth, Rachel died

and Jacob named his son, Benjamin, which means "son of my right hand." (*Gen 35:19*) Jacob calling Benjamin, "The son of His right hand" reveals a testimony of who Yeshua is.

Even though Yeshua has done valiantly for us, His life was not easy. In fact, He was under attack even as a baby. The king of Israel, Herod, was approached by magi from the Far East searching for the true King of Israel, Yeshua the Messiah. Herod tried to deceive them to find out where Yeshua was so he could kill Him. But God told the magi not to return to Jerusalem or Herod. God protected His Son and sent Joseph and Mary to Egypt until Herod died and the danger to Yeshua passed.

The expression 'right-hand' conveys strength and victory. 1 Corinthians 15:57 says, "but thanks be to God, who gives us the **victory** through our Lord **Jesus Christ**." Yeshua, the Lord's RIGHT HAND, was born in meekness and humility, just like you and me, to accomplish GREAT and MIGHTY things. Did you know that through Yeshua, you are also called to achieve Great and Mighty things?

The prophet Isaiah told us that Yeshua would be called Emmanuel, which means:

While Yeshua and His disciples were ministering in the Galilee region, a crowd began to gather, and Yeshua instructed them to get into a boat and cross to the other side of the sea. As they crossed the Kinneret (Sea of Galilee), a storm suddenly arose. In fact, the storm was so fierce that the waves were filling the boat with water. Although the disciples were fishermen, they became frightened, but Yeshua was sleeping! Let's read the account from the Scriptures to see what happens next.

_____:25-27, "And they came to *Him* and woke Him, saying, "Save *us*, Lord; we are _____!" He said to them, "Why are you afraid, you men of little _____?" Then He got up and _____ the winds and the sea, and it became perfectly calm. The men were _____, and said, "What kind of a man is this, that even the winds and the sea obey Him?"



Have you ever been so impressed by something someone can do, only to find out there's another AMAZING thing they can do that you didn't know about? Imagine that's exactly how the disciples felt! While on the shore, Yeshua healed a leper, the paralyzed servant of the Centurion, and Peter's mother-in-law. Yeshua had the power to heal those He

was next to as well as those far from Him through the power of His spoken word. The disciples must have been in awe of what Yeshua was doing, but then He, Yeshua, told the wind and the waves to be still. Isn't this Amazing!

Considering all that Yeshua was doing in front of the disciples, you'd think they would have enough faith to call out in the Lord's name and calm the waves themselves. No, they went to Yeshua, who was sleeping, and begged Him to take care of them. Why would Yeshua call out their lack of faith?

Do you ever struggle with faith? Which parts of your life could use more trust in God?

[Read Joshua 10:11-15]

What did Joshua ask of the Lord? _____

We see two main points in this story. The first is how the Lord God, the creator of heaven and earth, commanded the Sun and Moon to stop just as Joshua requested. Can you see how the Lord has authority over the Sun and Moon? The second point is how Joshua asked the Lord to make the sun and moon stop. Joshua had the faith to believe in God's power to act. Both of these points are very important for us and our lives.

Let's recall the story of Yeshua calming the waves and the wind. The disciples were amazed because Yeshua was GOD! He is the same God who commanded the Sun and Moon to stand still during Joshua's time. Additionally, we can say that Yeshua expected His disciples to have the same faith as Joshua, who remained courageous and strong.

Yeshua demonstrated His authority over the sick, the paralyzed, and even the wind and waves. He invites us to have deep faith in Him and trust Him in every circumstance we face. Do you realize that He wants you to call out to Him and believe in His ability to calm the storm of your life? He does, and you can call out to Him. He will hear you and rescue you.

The Gospel of Matthew, in chapters 8-9, is full of stories of Yeshua traveling through the region of Galilee, healing people of all their ailments and diseases. People were coming from every part of Israel to see the healer, Yeshua. Yeshua's reputation was growing, and the religious leaders were unhappy about how famous Yeshua was becoming. Since it was not yet the time for Yeshua to be betrayed or handed over to sinful men for His crucifixion, He told two blind men to keep quiet about what He had done.

The fact that Yeshua wanted His fame to remain quiet for a while is very important to faith. First, remember prophecy and its role and purpose. Prophecy is given to declare what is yet to happen. Yeshua still had much to accomplish before He would be handed over to evil men. Second, Yeshua was there to glorify the Father, not Himself. Because of this, Yeshua wanted these miracles to be kept silent so that people would glorify the Father and His love, not the excitement of a public healing on

earth. Yeshua was pointing attention forward, beyond where people are in the moment. He is still doing the same for you and me today.

How has the compassion of Yeshua caused you to glorify God more?

Can you see how God is glorified in this verse? Yeshua, being God on earth, wanted all glory and honor to be directed to God, not to God in the flesh. Let's look at one example of this prophecy of Yeshua being fulfilled. [Read Matthew 9:27-31]

The men responded to Yeshua with a big ole "YES"! Filled with joy and hope, they confirmed their faith in His power to make them see again. Consider why Yeshua asked them about their faith.

Do you see it? Yeshua is asking whether the men have faith or not to reward them and bless them for their reliance upon God. Do you believe Yeshua is God? Do you believe Yeshua is a rewarder of those who seek Him?

Listen to what Yeshua told the disciples of John when they asked Yeshua if He was the "Expected One". _____:22, "And He answered and said to them, "Go and _____ to John what you have seen and heard: ***the blind receive sight, the lame _____, the lepers are _____, and the deaf _____, the _____ are raised up, the _____ have _____ the gospel preached to them.***"

The disciples of John believed in the scriptures and the testimony of Yeshua. They proclaimed Him as the Messiah. Their eyes were opened to truly know Him and recognize Him as GOD. Are your eyes open to see that Yeshua is your God who offers you salvation? Take a moment to pray to Yeshua now and ask Him to open your eyes so you can see Him more clearly!

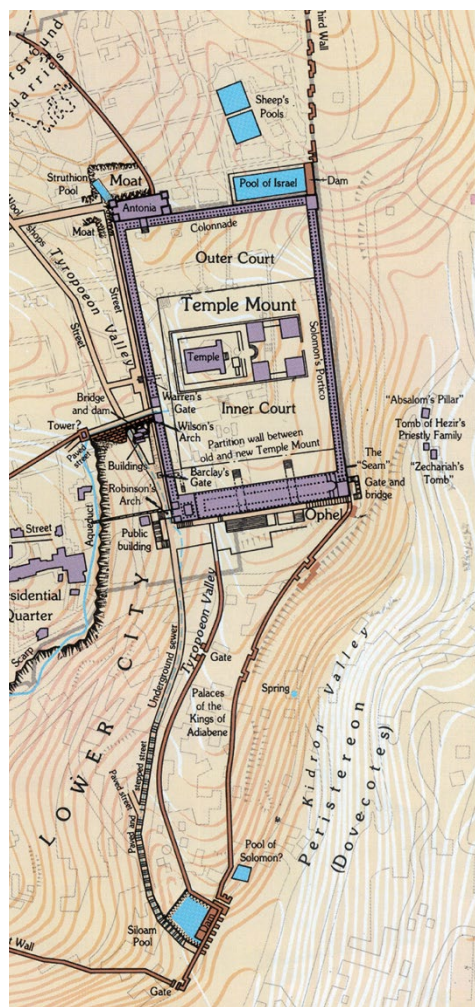

Let's open our Bibles and start reading from John 5. Bethesda is often translated as "**House of Mercy**." Do you think this name suits a place where the Lord would bring healing to His people?

Let's continue reading from John 5. [Read verses 5-9]

1. How many years did the lame man sit by the pool?
2. Why had he been waiting for so long?
3. Why didn't anyone help him?
4. Who DID help him?

Please notice what Yeshua said to the lame man before giving him healing. He said, "Do you wish to be healed?" Does this seem strange to you?

Of course, the lame man wanted to be healed, but he thought it was hopeless because no one would help him into the pool. Do you think we can sometimes feel like this too? There is only one way we can be made well. Going to the doctor, taking medication, seeing a chiropractor, and changing your diet are all ways we try to bring healing to our bodies. We seek counsel from others and try many remedies, but all the while Yeshua asks us, **"DO WE WISH TO BE WELL?"** Yeshua offers you and me an invitation to receive healing—true healing, miraculous healing that only comes from Him. Do you accept Yeshua's invitation for healing whenever you are sick?

So many of us trust and hope in what we see, but Yeshua is the God of the **impossible!** He makes everything **POSSIBLE**. The lame man was waiting for the water to heal him, then Yeshua appeared and said, "GET UP" and that is exactly what the man did.

Share a story of a miraculous healing that Yeshua has performed for you, your family, or someone you know.

Is there someone in your life who needs miraculous healing? You can share with them the invitation Yeshua gives us. Point them to Yeshua and tell them about His miraculous healing and great love for them.

Today, we are going to explore something SO powerful - the power of the **Resurrection**. Often in scripture, we read about truths that appear in stories, giving us a picture of God's heart and His desire for us. We know from Daniel and the lion's den about God's protection over us. We also see from the miracle of Jesus calming the sea and the wind, His power over all creation. Do you know what John 11:4 is referring to? What miracle is Yeshua about to perform? Today, we will uncover His miraculous power over **life** and **death**. [Read Psalm 139:13-16]



The miracle of life is so **powerful**, yet the reality of this life is physical death. Hebrews 9:27 says, "And inasmuch as it is appointed for men to die once and after this *comes* judgment." Scripture is clear. Death comes to everyone who has experienced life. But is death the end? Let's look at this story.

Yeshua and His disciples were near Jerusalem when they received sad news from their dearest of friends.

Mary, Martha, and Lazarus lived in the village called Bethany, about 2 miles from Jerusalem. The word that Yeshua and the disciples heard about Lazarus was a sickness that only Yeshua could.

The family invited Yeshua to come quickly and heal their brother. They knew who Yeshua was and believed that He could do all things; nothing is/was too difficult for Him. When Yeshua heard that Lazarus was sick, He said, "This sickness is not to end in death, but for the glory of God, so that the Son of God may be glorified by it." Throughout biblical history, God has used pictures and types to explain truths to His people. Here are some examples: The Garden of Eden is a picture of our Eternal Home; Noah's ark represents salvation through water baptism; and King David is a type of King Yeshua.

Biblical pictures and types show us two main things: First, we understand that what has happened in the past, God will bring about again in the future. Second, by understanding types, we learn about the character and actions of biblical individuals, which reveals God's ultimate plan. Most of all, pictures and

types teach us about who we are, God's love for us, His warnings and instructions, and who the Messiah is, was, and is to come. Today, we will take a look at a very important typology found in scripture.

Hopefully, you accepted the challenge and enjoyed what you learned. Today, we will continue exploring an Old Testament typology of Yeshua. Remember, a typology is a picture of a past event that will happen again in the future, as well as a way to identify the character and actions of a biblical individual who shows us God's ultimate plan. We also see another individual who reflects the character of God. Let's take a look at Joseph.

Joseph was the first son of Rachel, Jacob's wife, and he was loved by his father. Jacob made him a beautiful, multi-colored coat. As a boy, Joseph often went out into the fields to be with his brothers. Once, he overheard some of their actions and words that would displease Jacob, their father. Joseph reported **everything** his brothers had done to Jacob, which made his brothers very **angry** with him. Joseph enjoyed doing things his father approved of, but his brothers preferred to do their own things, so they grew jealous of him. Their anger increased after he shared a dream in which they would bow down and worship him.

_____:10-11, "He related *it* to his father and to his brothers; and his father _____ him and said to him, "What is this _____ that you have had? Shall I and your mother and your brothers actually come to __ ourselves down before you to the ground?" ¹¹ His brothers were _____ of him, but his _____ kept the saying *in mind*."

Sometime later, Jacob sent Joseph from Hebron to check on his brothers and the flock. When Joseph's brothers saw him coming, they plotted to kill him.

_____:18, "When they _____ him from a _____ and before he came close to them, they _____ against him to put him to _____."

Yeshua was **DESPISED** and **REJECTED** by His own people, just like Joseph was. In his hometown of Nazareth, many didn't believe He was the Messiah. In fact, when Yeshua spoke at the synagogue in Nazareth, the people became **enraged** at Him.

_____:28-29, "And all *the people* in the _____ were filled with _____ as they heard these things; and they got up and drove Him out of the city, and led Him to the brow of the hill on which their city had been built, in order to _____ Him down the cliff."

Can you see how the people of Nazareth, Yeshua's own family, plotted to kill Him just as Joseph's brothers planned to kill Joseph? Here is another example of Yeshua's own people planning to have Him **KILLED**.

Joseph was unloved and despised by his family and those around him. Those closest to him sought to kill him. Yeshua was also hated and despised. His own people and his closest disciple sought to put him to death. God shows us about Yeshua through the life of His servant Joseph. Can you think of any more connections between Joseph and Yeshua?

Last week, we discussed the difficult life of Joseph, the unloved son of Jacob. We learned that he was loved by his father, but his brothers were angry with him because he shared visions in which he was being exalted above them and they were bowing low before him. Think about it: How would you feel if you had to bow low in service before one of your youngest siblings? Would it be difficult?

Today, we will be exploring God's plans and purposes. We will see how, even when it seems like God isn't watching us or active in our lives, He has a plan, and we can trust Him. Looking back to Joseph: His brothers sold him to slave traders who took him to Egypt. In Egypt, Joseph became a servant in the house of Potiphar, the Captain of Pharaoh's bodyguard. Joseph excelled in his role and was promoted to second in command over the household. But, Potiphar's wife had wicked intentions for Joseph, and because Joseph refused her, she in turn had him thrown into prison.

While in prison, the Lord was with Joseph and showed His lovingkindness to him. Soon, Joseph was put in charge of all the prisoners.

While in prison, God gave Joseph the ability to interpret the dreams of two of Pharaoh's servants. His interpretations proved to be accurate! Later, Joseph interpreted a dream for Pharaoh himself. When Pharaoh's confidence in Joseph's interpretation grew, Pharaoh declared this over Joseph:

_____:39-40, "So _____ said to Joseph, "Since God has _____ you of all this, there is _____ one so discerning and _____ as you are. You

shall be over my _____, and according to your command all my people shall do homage; only in the _____ I will be greater than you."

From being hated and despised by his brothers to becoming second in the entire kingdom of Egypt, Joseph was elevated to the top, to a position where many people would bow down and honor him. And yes, his brothers bowed low too. When the famine struck the land, the brothers came to buy food. Joseph returned their money to their bags and accused them of theft. As a result, Joseph detained Simeon and sent the brothers away to bring Benjamin to Egypt. When the brothers finally brought Benjamin to Egypt, Joseph inquired of their father.

_____:28, "They said, "Your _____ our father is well; he is still alive." They _____ down in _____."

The same brothers who once sold their brother into slavery are now humbling themselves in honor of their younger brother. This was all part of God's plans and purposes. We see that Joseph encouraged his brothers and reassured them that God is in control.

In the same way, God chose to send His son, Yeshua, to serve each of us. This plan God made allows us to share in the joy of Yeshua's victory. Just as Joseph suffered and was glorified, Yeshua suffered and was glorified. Yeshua was raised from the dead on the third day and has given us hope for our resurrection. Joseph's family was glorified and honored through Joseph, and we are glorified through the Life and Testimony of Yeshua. Now, we can trust in Yeshua until the end of days, knowing that God intends all of this for our good and His glory.

Yeshua told His disciples that He was going to prepare a place for them in His Father's house in Heaven. We should understand that Yeshua is coming back for us on the day He has set. To help us wait for Him and to be confident that He IS, in fact, coming for us. God sent the Holy Spirit to help us. Here is what Yeshua told His disciples about the Holy Spirit's arrival:

_____:16-17, "I will ask the _____, and He will give you another _____, that He may be with you _____; *that is* the Spirit of _____, whom the world cannot receive because it does not see _____ or know _____, *but* you know Him because He _____ with you and will be in you."

When Yeshua ascended into Heaven, He asked the Father to send the Spirit of Truth to be with those who believe. This happened on Shavuot (Acts 2). God's Holy Spirit was poured out on the people of Jerusalem during a Gospel message by the Apostle Peter. Many people speaking different languages could understand what Peter was saying to them. As a result, they believed and were filled with the Spirit of GOD! They then began to live their lives with the hope that Messiah would return for them too.

Yeshua wants us to be ready for His return, so He told us there would be many tough times ahead. He wants us to endure and stay strong in our faith until He comes back.
