PeADD BOARD MEETING MINUTES

- I. **Call to Order** – PeADD Board Chair, Judge Todd Mansfield, called the meeting to order at 12:00 PM CT with a quorum present. The meeting was conducted in person at Pennyrile Area Development District and virtually via Zoom.
- II. **Pledge of Allegiance & Invocation** – Judge Jack Whitfield led the pledge, and Mr. Hollis Alexander of KACo led the invocation.
- III. **Approval of Minutes** – The June 8, 2026, Board of Directors Meeting Minutes were presented for review and approval. A copy was sent to the committee before the meeting for review and included in the meeting packet.

MOTION – Mayor Arthur Green moved to approve the minutes as presented. Mayor Kevin Cotton seconded the motion, and the motion was approved by the Board.

- IV. **Financial Report** – Mr. Lee Wilson, Treasurer of the PeADD Board, presented the Monthly Financial Report as of June 30, 2026, for review and approval. Mr. Wilson stated that at this point in the fiscal year close-out, expenditures are at 85.5%, and all line items remain within the budget. He mentioned that expenses and revenues will continue to be accrued through the close of the fiscal year. A copy of the financial report was included in the meeting packet.

MOTION – Mayor Kevin Cotton moved to approve the Monthly Financial Report as presented. Judge Jaime Smith seconded the motion, and the motion was approved by the Board.

- V. **Federal & State Reports** – Legislative updates were provided by Ms. Morgan Alvey, Field Representative for Senator Mitch McConnell’s office; Mr. Austin Wetherington, Field Representative for Congressman Comer’s office; Ms. Martha Jane King, Field Representative for the Department for Local Government; Mr. Cheyton Pendley, Workforce Program Analyst for Delta Regional Authority; and Mr. Greg Meredith, Field Service Representative for Rural and Municipal Aid/KYTC.

VI. **Staff Reports -**

1. **Community & Economic Development** – Ms. Amy Frogue, Director of Community & Economic Development (CED), presented the Community and Economic Development Department's FY27 work plan, outlining six core strategic focus areas including Economic Development, Community Development, Infrastructure, Planning, Disaster Resiliency, and GIS. The department manages 302 ongoing projects worth approximately \$701 million across the region, with an operating budget of \$1.3 million supporting eight full-time and one part-time staff position. Key priorities for FY27 include continuing federal partnerships through EDA and DRA programs, addressing the region's substantial water and wastewater infrastructure needs totaling \$585 million, and beginning a five-year hazard mitigation plan update.
2. **Health & Family Services** – Ms. Amanda Stokes, Director of Aging & Independent Living, presented on services focusing on aging and independent living programs serving 52,613 adults age 60 and over in the Pennyrile region. The department projects significant reductions in home-

delivered meal services for FY27, with a \$1.7 million shortfall compared to FY26, serving 723 individuals across the region. Ms. Stokes explained the distinction between high-priority and low-priority clients based on factors like support systems and mobility, noting that the current service expansion post-pandemic allowed for broader client access than historically practiced. Ms. Stokes presented multiple scenarios for addressing funding shortfalls in home-delivered meal services, including maintaining current allocations, accounting for attrition rates, and implementing hybrid meal options. She emphasized that no decision has been made yet and outlined a plan for the executive committee and county judges to determine a preferred scenario, which will then be presented to the full board for approval at the August meeting. Ms. Stokes presented on various other programs including the National Family Caregiver Program, Kentucky Caregiver Program for grandparents raising grandchildren, and the Senior Community Service Employment Program (Title V), with an estimated FY27 budget of \$3,814,211. Mr. Payton Kidd, Director of Long Term Services and Supports, presented the work plan for the Long-Term Services and Support Department, detailing projections for Home Community Based Waiver programs, Participant Directed Service options, Traditional options, and Veterans Directed Care Program, with a total department budget of \$50.8 million for FY27 representing an increase of \$1.7 million.

3. **West Kentucky Workforce Board** – Ms. Sheila Clark, WKWB Executive Director, presented an overview of the West Kentucky Workforce Board, highlighting their service to 17 counties through various programs including adult services, youth programs, and military transition activities. The board serves 42 members with a budget exceeding \$4 million and has achieved high placement rates of 87.5% for adults and 100% for dislocated workers.
4. **Administration** – Hayla Swaw, Chief Financial Officer, provided an administration update, outlining the Finance and Administration work plan for FY27, which manages a total budget of \$60.8 million and serves as a foundation for all programs through financial management, regulatory compliance, and administrative services.

VII. New Business

1. **Monthly Code of Ethics Report** – Judge Todd Mansfield stated that no Code of Ethics issues or violations had been reported since the last meeting.
2. **Approval of the FY2027 Budget** – Mr. Lee Wilson, PeADD Board Treasurer, presented the PeADD Budget for review and approval, beginning with the total projected revenue for FY 2027, which is \$60.9 million, an increase of approximately \$14.6 million over the prior year's most recently revised budget. He continued, stating that Aging & Independent Living reflects an overall budget reduction of approximately \$2.1 million. The decrease is primarily attributed to the cut to additional funds received for our meal programs over the past several fiscal years since the COVID pandemic and the 4% reductions to state-funded Aging programs based on our expected DAIL allocations. Although allocations have not yet been finalized, the proposed budget has been developed using these conservative funding assumptions.

Long-Term Services and Supports reflects continued growth in PeADD's Financial Management Services programs. The most significant increase is within the Veterans Directed Care Program, which continues to expand as additional veterans enroll and receive services across 4 states, contributing substantially to the overall increase in the FY2027 budget.

Mr. Wilson continued with Training & Workforce Development, which reflects modest decreases in both total and operating funding as grant allocations fluctuate due to changing funding levels and the various stages of multi-year grant awards.

He also pointed out that Community & Economic Development reflects continued investment through several new and expanded initiatives, including Hazard Mitigation Planning, Disaster Resiliency Capacity Building, and local planning contracts, while the completion of certain projects, such as Safe Streets and Roads for All, offsets a portion of that growth.

Overall, Mr. Wilson stated that projected expenditures total approximately \$57.1 million, reflecting the increase in program activity anticipated during FY 2027. While projected revenues exceed expenditures by approximately \$3.7 million, these funds are necessary to provide adequate working capital for our Financial Management Services (FMS) programs. PeADD is responsible for funding payroll well in advance of reimbursement, particularly within the Veterans Directed Care (VDC) program, where biweekly payrolls are projected to average approximately \$1.2 million by the end of FY27, but reimbursements are received approximately 12 weeks after services are provided and billed. Maintaining sufficient operating reserves ensures PeADD can continue meeting payroll obligations while awaiting reimbursement and protects against interruptions in service to the individuals we serve.

MOTION – Mayor Kevin Cotton moved to approve the FY2027 Budget as presented. Judge Kota Young seconded the motion, and the motion was approved by the Board.

3. **Director's Report** – PeADD Executive Director, Mr. Jason Vincent, introduced two new board members. They included Malcolm West, the newly appointed mayor of Central City, and Darrin Benton, who was nominated to fill Andy Swansey's unexpired term due to health issues.

Mr. Vincent announced that NADO conference registration is approaching and board members planning to attend should make it known. In closing, he invited the board to Alisha Sutton's upcoming retirement reception on July 31st here in the PeADD office.

VIII. Other Business – There was no other business.

- IX. Adjourn** – With no further business, Judge Jaime Smith moved to adjourn the meeting at 1:12 PM CT. Mayor Kevin Cotton seconded the motion, and the meeting adjourned.

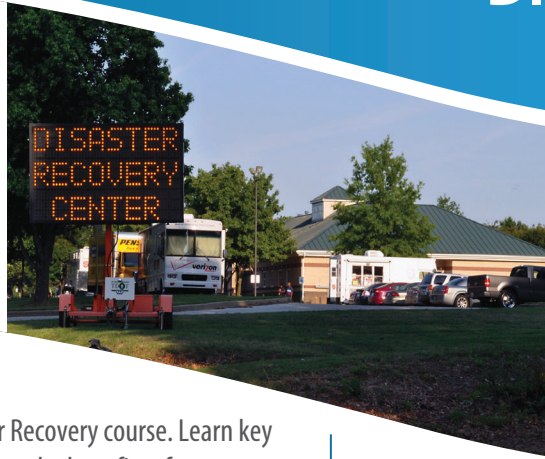

Project Description

Project involves hardening and grid modernization of the Princeton Electric Plant Board power distribution grid in Princeton, Kentucky. The proposed work includes replacement of 67 aging wood distribution poles (in key industrial and commercial areas) with new steel structures (capable of withstanding winds up to 140mph), installation of approximately 14 automated reclosers, deployment of ~15,000 feet of aerial fiber optic cable to support real-time monitoring and control of newly deployed reclosers, and upgrades to utility server hardware that supports SCADA, OMS, DMS, and AMI back-end operations. Project work will occur in an area bounded by Medical Center Drive to the east, the Paducah and Louisville Railway to the South, Interstate 69 to

the north, and Training Center Drive to the west (reference centerpoint 37.107384, -87.908914). One recloser will also be installed near the intersection of South Jefferson Street and Grooms Lane (37.093330, -87.893289). Project will commence upon execution of grant agreements and release of funds.

Need for project

The PEPB distribution system includes aging wood poles on critical circuits, limited feeder automation, and insufficient communications bandwidth to support modern operations. Since December 2021, the system has been impacted by five federally declared disasters, with more than 160 poles broken, many in high-impact areas. Without these upgrades, the utility will continue to experience longer restoration times due to manual switching, higher storm-related damage, limited crew members, and no ability to implement advanced distribution automation or remote switching capabilities.

Project Description

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Caldwell County proposes the design and construction of a 15,000 square foot, freestanding, FEMA P-361-compliant Community Safe Room on the consolidated campus of the Caldwell County School System in Princeton, Kentucky. This is the county's first and only purpose-built public tornado safe room. The facility will be engineered in full compliance with FEMA P-361 (4th Edition), ICC 500-2020, IBC 2021, ASCE 7-22, ADA Standards, and the Kentucky Building Code. The structure will be designed to withstand EF5 tornado winds of 250 mph and tornado-borne debris impacts per FEMA P-361 Table 1-1 and ICC 500 Section 304. Construction will be cast-in-place reinforced concrete or reinforced concrete masonry unit (CMU) to provide monolithic structural resistance to extreme wind loading and missile impact. The facility will accommodate a minimum of 2,300 occupants at 5 square feet per occupant per FEMA P-361 guidelines, with multiple perimeter egress points per ICC 500 Section 407 designed for full occupant ingress within the FEMA-recommended warning time.

Need for project

Currently, no FEMA-compliant public tornado shelter exists anywhere in Caldwell County. All four fatalities in the December 2021 EF-4 tornado were individuals caught outside their residences without access to adequate shelter. The project disproportionately benefits the county's most vulnerable populations: children (Pre-K through 12th grade), mobile home residents (two of the four 2021 fatalities resided in mobile homes), individuals without access to private shelter, elderly residents, and persons with disabilities for whom existing improvised shelter locations are inaccessible or non-compliant.

Will also be installing 9 new manholes along and about W Washington Street also. The existing gravity sewer line has deteriorated beyond practical repair and no longer provides reliable service to the collection system. Years of structural degradation have resulted in severe root intrusion, pipe deformation, and localized collapses that significantly restrict flow and prevent effective maintenance activities. Portions of the line are inaccessible to conventional sewer cleaning equipment and closed-circuit television (CCTV) inspection, limiting the utility's ability to assess conditions, perform preventative maintenance, or respond effectively to system issues. The deteriorated condition of the sewer main and associated manholes has increased the potential for inflow and infiltration (I&I), exfiltration, blockages, and sanitary sewer overflows, particularly during periods of wet weather and elevated system flows. These deficiencies pose a threat to public health, environmental quality, and regulatory compliance while increasing operation and maintenance costs for the utility. In addition to impacting existing customers, the limited hydraulic capacity and poor structural condition of this sewer segment have created a significant constraint on future growth within the service area. The inability to provide reliable and expandable wastewater infrastructure has impeded potential residential, commercial, and industrial development within the affected sewer shed. Replacement and rerouting of this critical sewer main are necessary to restore system reliability, reduce the risk of sewer overflows, improve operational efficiency, and provide the infrastructure capacity needed to support future community growth and economic development.

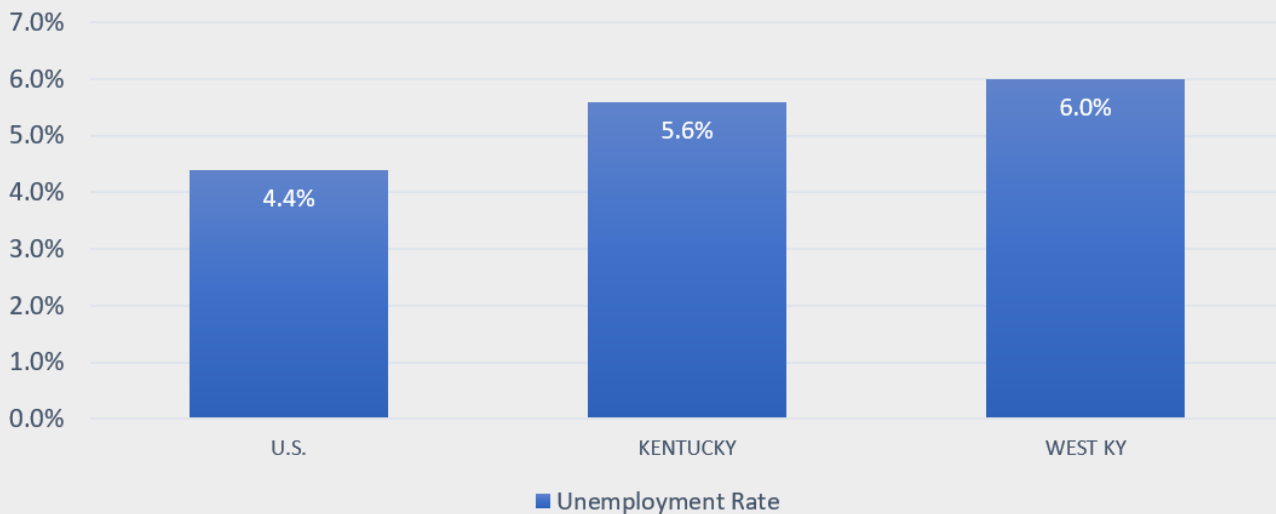

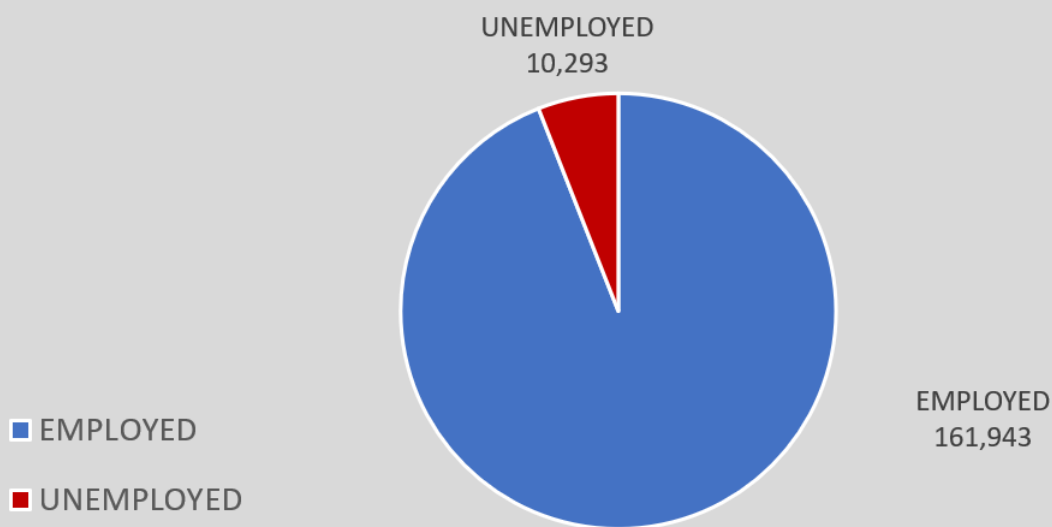

Purchase / Pennyriple Local Workforce Area



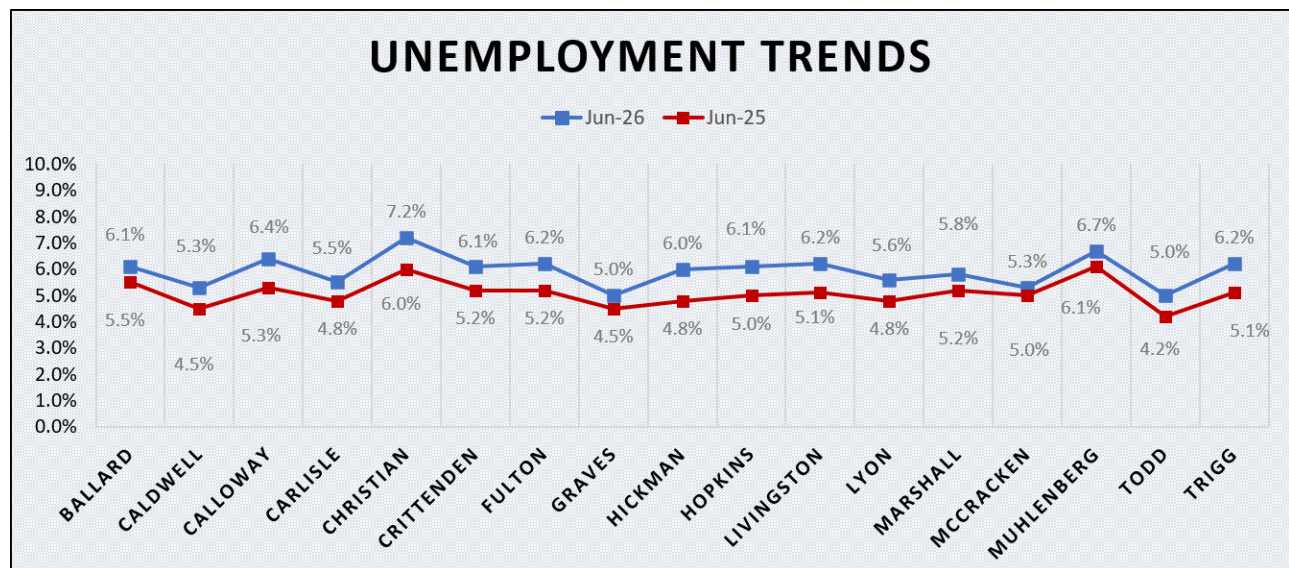

**A RESOLUTION URGING GREATER TRANSPARENCY IN THE ALLOCATION AND
DISTRIBUTION OF STATE TRANSPORTATION FUNDING**

WHEREAS, safe and well-maintained transportation infrastructure is essential to public safety, economic development, workforce mobility, emergency response, and the overall quality of life of Kentucky's citizens; and

WHEREAS, Kentucky's cities and counties are responsible for maintaining local roads, streets, bridges, drainage systems, and other transportation infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, local governments rely upon transportation funds administered or distributed by the Commonwealth of Kentucky and the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet, including flex funds, County Road Aid, Municipal Road Aid, discretionary funds, and other local transportation programs; and

WHEREAS, timely and accurate information regarding the availability, allocation, and distribution of these funds is necessary for local governments to develop budgets, prioritize projects, schedule maintenance, and plan for long-term infrastructure needs; and

WHEREAS, transparency helps local governments make informed decisions, coordinate projects, leverage available resources, and direct limited public funds toward the areas of greatest need; and

WHEREAS, the Pennyrile Regional Transportation Committee has requested that the Pennyrile Area Development District Board of Directors formally support greater transparency in the allocation and distribution of transportation funds;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the Pennyrile Area Development District respectfully urges the Commonwealth of Kentucky and the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet to provide clear and timely information regarding the allocation and distribution of transportation funding available to cities, counties, and other local entities.

July 23, 2026

MEMBERS PRESENT – Mayor Kevin Cotton, Mr. Bart Frazer, Mayor Arthur Green, Judge Stan Humphries, Judge Todd Mansfield, Judge Mack McGehee, Judge Perry Newcom, Judge Jaime Smith, Mr. Lee Wilson, and Judge William “Kota” Young.

STAFF PRESENT – Mr. Payton Kidd, LTSS Director; Ms. Amanda Stokes, AIL Director; Ms. Hayla Swaw, CFO; Ms. Melissa Thompson, Comms. Director, and Mr. Jason Vincent, PeADD Executive Director.

CALL TO ORDER – Judge Todd Mansfield, Board Chair, called the meeting to order at 11:00 AM (CT) and recognized a voting quorum. The meeting was conducted virtually via Zoom.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES – Minutes from the June 15, 2026, Executive Committee meeting were presented for approval. A copy was sent to the committee before the meeting for review and included in the meeting packet.

MOTION – Mayor Kevin Cotton moved to accept the minutes as presented. Judge Mack McGehee seconded the motion. No questions or comments were raised, and the motion carried.

HOME DELIVERED MEALS DISCUSSION – Mr. Jason Vincent reported that due to additional funding of \$405,000 received from the Department for Aging and Independent Living, they decided to delay any changes to the home delivered meal service for 30 days to determine the best way to use the new funds. The committee agreed to continue serving clients with the highest level of need while exploring options to potentially serve more individuals with lesser needs once the impact of the additional funding is assessed.

Mr. Vincent announced that despite receiving an additional \$405,000, the organization will still need to make significant program reductions as they are short by approximately \$1.7 million. Ms. Hayla Swaw mentioned that they would notify the PACS board about the upcoming cuts to prevent frequent changes. The team agreed to continue their current approach for the next 30 days, which includes not adding new clients and allowing attrition to reduce the client count, with 12 clients already dropped between July 1 and July 23, bringing the total down to 711.

MEDICAID FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT SERVICES RFP – Mr. Vincent discussed the Medicaid Financial Management Services RFP and the Area Development District's protest against the state's decision to remove financial management from districts and assign it to a single statewide provider. The discussion focused on a potential legal action against the Cabinet for Health and Family Services regarding the removal of FMS services from Area Development Districts. Mr. Vincent presented a data showing the financial impact across the network, totaling \$16 million and affecting 30 direct employees. The group discussed the progress of resolutions from various Area Development Districts, with 9 already on board. The conversation ended with the approval of a resolution authorizing Jason and the chairman to sign necessary documents for potential legal action, though they emphasized exhausting all administrative options before filing a lawsuit.

MOTION – Mayor Kevin Cotton moved to approve the Resolution Authorizing Pennyrrile Area Development District to Pursue Legal Action as presented. Judge Perry Newcom seconded the motion. No further questions or comments were raised, and the motion carried.

OTHER BUSINESS – No further business was discussed.

ADJOURN – Mayor Kevin Cotton moved to adjourn the meeting at 11:25 AM (CT). Judge Mack McGehee seconded the motion, and the meeting adjourned.
