Plaque Presentation



Recipients received their Plaques from President Dr. Robert Carley at Christmas Potluck Dec 14th, 2022.

The purpose of the NHS historical plaque program is to recognize built structures that are of a certain age, or have some particular significance in the history and/or of the development of the Township of Nassagaweya.

The introduction of this program is meant to educate the community about historic buildings within the former Nassagaweya Township. To instill a sense of pride and respect in the township and its historic architecture, and to inform the public at large about the historical aspect of residences and structures in the former Nassagaweya Township. To tell the story of our former Township to residents and tourists alike, and to foster an interest and understanding of our community's roots.

Owners of historic properties in the former Nassagaweya Township may apply for a plaque to adorn their house or other historical structure. Structures

need to be old enough to have been a part of the historical development of the former Nassagaweya Township, or to be significant in other ways. Applications will be assessed on these criteria. Plaques are priced at \$140.00, and includes a one year membership to Nasagieweya Historical Society for new members. The Plaques are to be installed by the property owner, in a location appropriate to their significance (assistance can be provided). These plaques are locally made by a small business.

Please know that participation in the NHS Historical Plaque Program does not involve property heritage designation by the Town of Milton, or any other municipality in Halton County under the Ontario Heritage Act. These are decorative plaques, and do not bind the property in any way.

World News

Ukraine/Russian War

On 24 February 2022, Russia invaded Ukraine in a major escalation of the Russo-Ukrainian War that began in 2014. The invasion caused Europe's largest refugee crisis since World War II, with more than 6.3 million Ukrainians fleeing the country and a third of the population displaced. The invasion also caused global food shortages.

“Freedom Convoy” Arrives in Ottawa and Begins Occupation of Capital

January 2022—Convoys of truckers, which had been making their way to Ottawa from Western and Eastern Canada, finally arrived in Canada's capital to protest public health mandates and restrictions. The convoys were cheered by supporters across the country, many of whom greeted them along highway overpasses. However, the protest's stated goal of unseating Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and overthrowing the government left many Canadians uneasy and brought to mind the insurrection at the US Capitol on 6 January 2021 — as did the presence of Confederate and Nazi flags among the protesters. With 85 per cent of Canadians vaccinated, including about 90 per cent of all truckers, the protest was seen as a far-right fringe movement. Observers noted that online rhetoric surrounding the protest had grown “increasingly worrisome.” Similar Freedom Convoy protests formed blockades at a border crossing in Coutts, Alberta, and at the Ambassador Bridge between Windsor, Ontario, and Detroit, Michigan, on 29 January and 7 February, respectively.

The 175th anniversary of Irish Mass Immigration to Canada during the Great Famine in Ireland

The Great Irish Famine of 1847 resulted in the death of over one million people, most from starvation, and incited over two million people to eventually emigrate from Ireland. In 1847, over 100,000 Irish sailed to Canada, although an estimated one in five did not survive due to harsh conditions on the ships. The destination for most of these ships was the port of Québec, where newcomers were required to stop at the quarantine island of Grosse-Île. Almost 5,000 Irish died on Grosse-Île, the island is the largest Irish burial ground outside of Ireland. Canada's most recent census lists the Irish as the fourth largest ethnic group in Canada. From their early settlements in Newfoundland in the 19th century, to their contributions in present-day Canadian society, Irish Canadians continue to flourish and celebrate their identity.

Pope apologizes to residential schools

July 28th 2022— visit to Quebec City, Pope Francis made some of his strongest remarks yet condemning Canada's former residential schools for indigenous children, specifically addressing the sexual abuse which occurred at the schools for the very first time. The Pope said Canada's Catholic Church was on a quote "new path" after being "devastated by the evil perpetrated by some of its children." Once again he apologized to all the victims. The Pope's comments arrive at the tail end of a self-described “penitential pilgrimage” to Canada this past week aimed at apologizing to survivors of the residential school system, which separated over 150,000 indigenous children from their families and subjected many of them to starvation and sexual abuse. That tour kicked off with a historic apology in the town of Maskwacis on Monday where the Pope met with indigenous leaders.

Queen Elizabeth II has died.

The document, published by National Records of Scotland on Thursday, says the late British monarch died at 3:10 p.m. UK time (10:10 a.m. ET) on September 8 at Balmoral Castle in Ballater, Scotland. The cause of death is listed as old age. Sept 29, 2022





Lest we Forget



Nov 28 1946

Nassagaweya Pays Tribute to Those Who Served 39-45

400 Attend Gathering Saturday at Brookville Hall When Watches and Clocks Presented

Over four hundred people, the largest crowd who ever jammed the Brookville Hall, gathered Saturday night in honor of the boys and girls who served with the armed forces in the Second World War.

An engraved gold watch was presented to each of the 113 men who served and wrist watches to the three women who enlisted. The next of kin of the five boys who lost their lives during the conflict were presented with suitable mantle clocks.

Lt. Col. J. K. Mahon, Campbellville, who made the presentation, read an illuminated address which was presented to each of the army personnel. Reeve Lloyd Crawford, chairman of the evening, expressed the gratitude of the municipality for the honor and self sacrifice each made in serving the country. He also referred to the families whose boys made the supreme sacrifice.

Lieut Maxwell Storey, of Nassagaweya, on behalf of the eighty veterans who were present, thanked the municipality for the most generous and valuable gift. Sgt. Gordon Porter, minister of the United Church, Milton, was the speaker of the evening. A musical program was supplied by talent from Galt. Those taking part were: R. B. McMurdo, bass soloist; Arthur Steggle, tenor; and Mrs. L. G. Crawford, pianist.

The entire program and presentation was sponsored by the Nassagaweya Municipal Township along with a number of veterans who served in the First Great War. Lt. Col. J. K. Mahon was chairman of this committee.

The evening concluded with refreshments served by the Nassagaweya Women's Institute.

The HOCKEY TEAMS

The first hockey team played on an outdoor rink built by the men who worked at the saw mill in the 1920's. The rink was built by leveling off the ground by slush scrapers drawn by horses and boards from the mill were placed around the outside. The water was poured by pail from the pond which also supplied the water for the steam engine that powered the saw mill. On Sunday afternoon's there would be hockey games between Moffat and visiting teams from the surrounding area

The rink was located west of the mill on the rear of what is now #2097 on 15 side road. The second Moffat team played their home games in the Milton arena on Brown Street. The players on this team mainly lived in the Moffat area. This team played in the Milton Industrial League in the late 40's and early 50's and won the championship in at least two different seasons. They also played in the Ontario Rural Hockey Association with success and in one season they came close to winning the Ontario championship, losing the final game by one goal

There was no baseball team again until 1960 when a small sign at the new Brookville School brought out enough players for a practice at the closed S.S. # 3 school. Three teams were organized and the games were played that year at the old school. The next year the use of the property at # 2039 15 side road was obtained and a local farmer leveled off the area for a ball diamond. The local parents erected a screen behind the plate as a back 36 stop, this was directly across from the church. The bases were made of jute sacks partially filled with sand. Boy's teams were organized in nearly every age group from 10yrs to 17yrs old. Some played in the Halton county league, others played in the Puslinch -Eramosa league. The teams raised their own funds by gathering unreturned bottles, sorting and returning them for a refund to then purchase sweaters and uniforms. In 1968 there was also girl's teams playing baseball. A new park was built by the Township of Nassagaweya and all the teams moved to Brookville, but it was some years before the names changed. A men's fastball team was formed in the early 80's and the Town of Milton built a new ball park at #1250 15 side road, this team played in a Guelph Industrial League.

Baseball in Moffat

The first organized hardball and soft ball games were usually played in the local school yards. As the school for the Moffat area was S.S. # 3 at the south corner of 15 side road and the 2nd line, any ball played prior to the 1930's was played there. In the 1930's Moffat had its own softball team and played in a park which is now #2068 on 15 side road. This park had a large score board which was erected by the sweet caporal cigarette company and had their name on it. The park was also used for many garden parties and the Callithumpian parades. The softball team had many good years culminating before the Second World War when in 1939 they were the runners up to Jerseyville Ontario for the Ontario Rural Softball Association Championship. During the winter there was a winter league that played in the Milton arena. Some of the players from Moffat also played there. The start of World War 2 ended the ball teams as the players went to war.



Nassagaweya pronunciation: Na-ghe-sah-ge-way-yong
(meaning a river with two outlets or dividing of the waters)

There are many theories of the naming of Nassagaweya (see the below). However, this mention from the following book, I believe is the most accurate.

“Shortly after its agreement with the Mississauga, the government of Upper Canada established two new townships on the lakefront. Nelson, named in honor of England’s most famous admiral and Trafalgar, named for his great naval victory over Napoleon in 1805. When they named the two townships immediately north of Trafalgar and Nelson, they retained the Mississaugas’ titles for Twelve mile and Sixteen Mile creeks. However, through ignorance they reversed the names. The township north of Trafalgar, in which Sixteen Mile Creek flowed, received the name Twelve Mile Creek (Ash-qua-sing) Esquesing and the government gave the township north of Nelson through which Twelve Mile Creek ran, the Indian’s designation (Nan-zuh-zau-ge-wa-zog) Nassagaweya for Sixteen Mile Creek . Neither side, Indian or white, understood the other. The names Nelson and Trafalgar were as foreign to the Mississaugas as Esquesing and Nassagaweya were to the settlers. “

Scared Feathers, The Reverend Peter Jones, and the Mississauga Indians by Donald B Smith

It is known that large numbers of Highlanders settled to the west of Toronto in the adjoining townships of Caledon in Peel county, Esquesing and Nassagaweya, both of Halton and Erin in Wellington county. Islay had been losing people since the 1830’s possibly earlier. Apparently Nassagaweya was populated primarily by Highlanders belonging to the Kirk”

The Township of Nassagaweya, Halton County, Ontario, was incorporated effective January 1, 1850 under the terms of the Baldwin Act, Chapter 81, Canada Statutes, 1849.

This act provided for the creation of municipal governments at the town, village and township levels and identified those which would automatically be granted municipal status when the act came into effect, January 1, 1850. Communities not named in the original act could petition the county council or legislative assembly for incorporation on reaching specified population levels.

An incorporated township, lower tier municipality, has a council consisting of an elected Reeve, Deputy Reeves, and councillors the number of which depend on the population of the township. Its responsibilities relate largely to the upkeep of the local road system and the delivery of services such as water and sewage. It has wide powers relating to the regulation of land and local administration through by-laws. It has the power to raise money through direct taxation on land and through the use of debentures.

The Township of Nassagaweya was dissolved and annexed to the Towns of Milton and Eramosa in 1971.

Purpose:

The purpose of the NHS historical plaque program is to recognize those built structures that are of a certain age, or are of some particular significance in the history and/or of the development of the Township of Nassagaweya.

Goals:

The introduction of this program is meant to educate the community about historic buildings within the former Nassagaweya Township. To instill a sense of pride and respect in the township and its historic architecture, and to inform the public at large about the historical aspect of residences and structures in the former Nassagaweya Township. To tell the story of our former Township to residents and tourists alike, and to foster an interest and understanding of our community's roots.

Who may apply:

Owners of historic properties in the former Nassagaweya Township may apply for a plaque to adorn their house or other historical structure. Structures need to be old enough to have been a part of the historical development of the former Nassagaweya Township, or to be significant in other ways. Applications will be assessed on these criteria.

Costs:

Plaques are priced at \$140.00 tax included, and provides a one year membership in the historical society for new members. They are to be installed by the property owner, in a location appropriate to their significance (assistance can be provided). These plaques are locally made by a small business.


