

### Dorothy Sarnes Memorial

#### To honor and remember those who impact on our lives.

Dorothy Sarnes (Reeder) was born in June 1910 in Nebraska. She attended Grand Island Business College where she graduated in August 1928. She met and married Cecil Sarnes in 1930.

In 1936, Dorothy and Cecil moved to Berkeley where, in the midfifties, they had an interior decorating business. Dorothy joined SI/Berkeley in 1961 where she served on all club committees and held all club offices including that of club president. When the Berkeley club closed, Dorothy transferred her membership to SI/El Cerrito.

Long before Founder Region existed, Dorothy was active as a Soroptimist region officer, serving as the Southwestern Region Secretary from 1972-1974. When the Fellowship program was incorporated in 1986, Dorothy was elected as the first District I Fellowship Director.

Still a member of SI/El Cerrito, Dorothy passed away in February 2010 shortly before her 100th birthday. The Dorothy Sarnes Memorial Fund is named to honor her and her nearly fifty year dedication to Soroptimist as well as to the Fellowship program.

This memorial fund was created to honor and remember those persons and organizations which have made an impact on our lives. The funds donated help to provide financial awards each year to women in the final phase of their doctoral studies. In addition to donations, bequests can be made by a Soroptimist or non-Soroptimist who identifies in her/his estate documents that Founder Region Fellowship is a beneficiary. 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### History

Founder Region Fellowship is Founder Region's identifying project and was started in 1948. Founder Region Fellowship is a non-profit 501(c)(3) program that provides awards to women in the final phase of their doctoral studies. It is almost entirely supported by the Soroptimist members and clubs within Founder Region. A byproduct of this support is the affirmation of the importance of the recipient's work and value as an individual. Our hope is to support women who are working in fields of great social importance that are traditionally held by men or fields that have a great social importance to the world. We hope the recipients will reflect and further Soroptimist ideals by becoming a strong voice for all women.

The program began in 1948 as a committee in Pacific Region. In 1952, Pacific Region divided into three regions, one of which was Southwestern Region. Southwestern Region administered the program until 1976. These are just a few of the fields of study in which the candidates are seeking a doctorate degree: Clinical Psychology, Endocrinology, Sociology, Genetics, Immunology, Zoology, Marine Biology, Civil Engineering, Nuclear Engineering, Bioengineering, Infectious Diseases, Agricultural Policy Reform, Law, Social Science and Special Education.

In 1976, Southwestern Region divided into three regions, Sierra Pacific, Sierra Nevada and Founder with the Fellowship program staying with Founder Region. Applications are now accepted from schools within the boundaries of Founder Region that offer doctoral programs. On March 17, 1986, Founder Region Fellowship, Inc. was formed and by conference action, the board of directors was elected. The first president of Founder Region Fellowship, Inc. was Julia "Bess" Combs, a past Governor of Founder Region and member of SI/Oakland-The Founder Club.

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# Keynote Speaker

Dr. Eric Haas, J.D., Ph.D.

Professor, Director of Ed Leadership Doctoral Program

Department of Educational Leadership

California State University, East Bay



Dr. Haas has been in education for over 30 years and he is currently the Director of the Doctoral Program in Educational Leadership for Social Justice at California State University, East Bay. He received his B.S. in electrical engineering from Notre Dame, a law degree from The Catholic University of America, and an MEd in Curriculum and Instruction and a PhD in Educational Leadership from Arizona State University. During his career, Dr. Haas has conducted research and program evaluations, managed schools, classrooms and research teams, and directed trainings of teachers, graduate students and community leaders. His research interests are in the legal rights and education experiences of English learners, promoting school reform, and the process of education policy change, with a focus on the influence of unconscious mental models on conscious decision-making. His work has been published in Educational Administration Quarterly, the Bilingual Research Journal, and the American Educational Research Journal, among others. Dr. Haas' recent book concerns best practices for educating English learners with learning differences.





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### Alina Nguyen

#### **Integrative Biology**

University of California, Berkeley

Dissertation: Organizational effect of hormones on brain sexual dimorphism and behavior in Xenopus laevis frogs.





Alina grew up in Minnesota with her parents, who were refugees from the Vietnam War, and spent much of her time fishing or catching insects. Her research seeks to answer how exposure to chemicals might change brain morphology and to ultimately link these brain changes. She hopes to spread awareness of chemical effects on reproduction and inspire, empower, and train women and other underrepresented minority scholars to become their own advocates for the environmental issues which they face daily or generationally.

Alina volunteers with Bay Area Scientists in Schools, which provides underrepresented students a chance to interact with scientists and engage in funscience experiments. She also volunteers with Expanding Your Horizons, a national program that introduces middle school girls to careers in STEM fields, and STEM First Year Initiative (FYI) on campus, which enhances retention and professional development of underrepresented, first-generation, women, and diverse scholars across all STEM fields.



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# 2023 Award Recipient

### Teena Bajaj

#### Comparative Biochemistry

University of California, Berkeley

Dissertation: Discovering the drugs against essential proteins of SARS-COV-2 for the treatment of COVID-19







Teena was born and brought up in a multicultural city - New Delhi, the capital of India. Being female, she faced gender discrimination in her family. Due to low socioeconomic background, both parents had to leave high school and never went to college; therefore, they encouraged and motivated her to receive higher education. She was fortunate to get an opportunity for an international summer internship program at Purdue University. This enriching experience introduced her to the real world of Science and motivated her to pursue a scientific career in basic sciences.

In early 2020, SARS-CoV-2 virus emerged and Teena switched her research to meet the unmet urgent needs of drugs against it and to contribute towards human welfare. Her project goal is to discover drugs against essential protein, papain like protease (PLpro) from SARS-CoV-2. Her long term goal is to become an independent researcher in the field of protein sciences and drug discovery where she can unravel mysterious discoveries.



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#### Randi Rollins

#### Zoology & Disease Ecology

University of Hawaii at Mānoa

Dissertation: Transmission of a zoonotic parasitic nematode, Angiostrongylus cantonensis





Randi grew up with four siblings in Utah, but began living on her own at just fifteen, never graduating from high school. As a single mother she enrolled in community college and later transferred to Weber State University (WSU) in Ogden, Utah. The positive impact of education changed her life. Her studies helped her understand the connections between wildlife, poverty, and human health, an early notion of the more recent 'One Health' paradigm.

Randi's dissertation is her foundation for a career in disease mitigation strategies for the betterment of public health. This dissertation work was established to understand the ecology, biology, and transmission cycle of rat lungworm, and apply the knowledge to other host-parasite systems to mitigate the detrimental effects of parasitic disease on people around the world. Neglected tropical diseases reduce education, and family and mental health outcomes, which ultimately decrease economic success, specifically in women.



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### 2023 Award Recipient

### Amy Var

#### Learning Design & Technology

University of Hawaii at Mānoa

Dissertation: Technology Integrated Higher Order Thinking Practices at Title I Public Middle Schools.





Amy has been a middle school English teacher for the past twenty-three years, working in public, low-income, Title I schools, where she has witnessed many curricular and pedagogical shifts. Through her research, she hopes to investigate ways technology can serve as a vehicle to help close the achievement gap and encourage more creativity, autonomy, innovation, and creation in the classroom.

Amy is a member of the Hawaii State Teachers Association (HSTA), the Hawaii Society for Technology in Education (HSTE), the International Society for Technology in Education (ISTE), the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE), the Association for Middle Level Education (AMLE), the Pi Lambda Theta National Honor Society in Education, and the Association for Educational Communications and Technology (AECT).



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#### Babalwa Kwanele

#### **Educational Leadership for Social Justice**

California State University, East Bay

Dissertation: It Takes a Village to Heal Trauma: A study of Black culturally affirming educational wellness programs.





### EAST BAY

Babalwa has a Master of Science degree in counseling with a concentration in Marriage and Family Therapy (MFT) and has worked over two decades providing complex trauma mental health care and training for people and families from marginalized communities. Her study will examine the fundamental issues on the intersectionality between antiblackness, trauma, and belonging as it impacts Black student success. The overall goal is to identify practices to create culturally affirming mental health, wellness, and academic programs that support the unique needs of Black women and girls.

Babalwa's volunteer efforts for the past eleven years have been in developing the African American Holistic Resource Center (AAHRC) in the City of Berkeley, which provides advocacy, support, and referral services for an array of educational issues, legal matters, as well as programming and activities for cultural, social, and recreational engagement.



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### 2023 Award Recipient

#### Nehal Eldeeb

#### Social Welfare

University of California, Berkeley

Dissertation: Centering Parent Voice: Exploring Parents' Needs and Preferences using Online Parenting Information





Nehal grew up in Qatar as an Egyptian attending a British private school, but when Egyptians were being deported for political reasons, her family immigrated to Canada in search of a better life. Studying International Politics at Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service in Qatar and her volunteer experiences fed her curiosity about improving the outcomes and well-being of marginalized children and adolescents.

She made the difficult decision to leave her country, and by cultural necessity, her marriage, in order to pursue graduate education. Her dissertation seeks to understand parents' needs and preferences for receiving online parenting information to develop and share effective information that prevents child maltreatment and promotes child well-being.



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### Joanne Qina`Au

#### Clinical Psychology

University of Hawaii at Mānoa

Dissertation: Decolonial wellbeing: a mixed-methods participatory project for theory development, preliminary instrument design, and empowerment materials for Kanaka Maoli

Joanne's ancestral roots are in Hawai'i, Japan, Ainu land, the Azores, Ireland, and a Jewish village in Germany. She grew up with her mother in 'Ewa Beach, a poor once-rural area on O'ahu, where she was frequently bullied for looking part-White. The purpose of her research, practice, teaching, and advocacy in clinical psychology is to uplift people from populations at-risk for multiple exposures to trauma.

Prior to her PhD, Joanne engaged in community work through Project Surya, an organization she founded to shed light on issues in the global community. In Hawai'i she provides well being services at the Pilina Center for Wellbeing, and to social justice advocates, including staff for the Hawai'i State Coalition Against Domestic Violence, where she received a collaboration award from the Lili'uokalani Trust.

### Erin McConkey

#### Anthropology

University of Hawaii at Mānoa

Dissertation: Snakebite Embodied: Venomous Snakes and Antivenom in Thailand

Erin's parents, both federal government employees, were stationed abroad during her early childhood and she encountered many different people, customs, and values. She was labeled a "weird" little girl because she liked reptiles, dinosaurs, and adventure. Her dissertation investigates the entanglements between the international anti venom industry, global health organizations, medical doctors, veterinarians, herpetologists, snake handlers, and snakes to re-evaluate taken-for-granted assumptions of science and medicine. Snakebite is a complex global health concern; at the same time, this research has rekindled her childhood fascination with reptiles.

Erin is the first student in her department to be awarded a Fulbright-Hays Fellowship in over a decade. Her professors had this to say, "through her research, Erin is blazing a trail for other women who would like to work in this field where female anthropologists rarely venture".
